Today I call upon fellow respected audience to always strive in increasing our taqwa of Allah Subhaanahu Wa Ta'aala, by diligently

performing all of His **Commands and avoiding** all of His prohibitions. May we all be spared from the wrath and of Allah torment Subhaanahu Wa Ta'aala.

I humbly invite fellow congregation to altogether ponder upon today's *khutbah* titled



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Alhamdulillaah today we are on the second Friday of the month of Shawwaal, and we are highly encouraged to visit our relatives, whether far or nearby. In this modern era that we are living in,

there is no reason for mankind to dismiss or set aside adab (manners or etiquette) and noble values in any situation even when it comes to strengthening the relationship. Looking at

the very concept of hospitality in Islam, it is associated with attitude and practices that are highly encouraged that one's imaan (faith) and nobility can be seen through the way one

receives and entertains guests. Because of that, Islam continues to encourage the practice of visiting one another to be kept alive. Therefore, preserving silaaturrahm (ties of kinship) is no

small matter for its value is truly great from the religious perspective. In talking about this matter, had Rasulullah promised the reward of Paradise for those that preserve silaaturrahm

and gave stern warning upon those that severs it.

It is narrated on the authority of Abu Ayoob al-Ansaari that a man came to the Prophet ³⁶ and said:

"Direct me to a deed which draws me near to Paradise and takes me away from the Fire (of Hell)." Upon this he (the Prophet ﷺ) said: "You worship Allah and never

associate anything with Him, establish prayer, and pay zakaat, and strengthen the ties of kinship (silaaturrahm)." When he turned his back, the Prophet **# remarked**:

"If he adheres to what he has been ordered to do, he would enter Paradise."

(al-Bukhaari and Muslim)

It is clear that with the noble practice of visiting one another, the bond of silaaturrahm can be further strengthened. Not just that, camaraderie can be fostered, one's concerns for others will

manifest, and ill thoughts extinguished. Whether we are acting as guests or we are the ones being visited (as hosts), both will gain favors.

As hosts, honoring the guests is from excellent akhlaaq (character) that is always instilled by the prophets. For example, the story of Prophet Ibraaheem honoring his guests was mentioned

in Soorah adh-Dhaariyaat, verses 24-26:

"Has there reached you the story of the honored guests of Abraham? -When they entered upon him and said,

"[We greet you with] peace." He answered, "[And upon you] peace, [you are] a people unknown." Then he went to his family and came with a fat [roasted] calf."

The scholars of tafseer elaborated on several lessons that can be derived from these words of Allah. Among them is to serve food and drinks to the guests, preparing the best dish available at

home, placing the food close to the guests, and speaking softly to them. Honoring the guests is greatly enjoined in Islam that Prophet Muhammad would relate such virtuous deed with imaan.

Therefore, when there are guests visiting us, let us rejoice and remain grateful. Seize it as an opportunity for us to increase our good deeds. Welcome them with open arms and open hearts,

and treat them in the best manner according to our capability. As hosts, we must have compassion and comprehend the situation, as well as being wise and prudent in serving the guests that

are present.

Guests that intend to visit the home of others must adhere to the necessary adab, among them is to choose a suitable time for visitation, avoid coming at

times when people are usually unprepared or times when people are usually resting or taking a nap. The best is to contact the host in seeking permission so that both the guests and

hosts will be in a comfortable position. Seek permission from the hosts before utilizing their belongings, and most importantly is to observe proper adab as guests.

Therefore, let us seize the opportunity with the presence of Shawwaal this time to revive the practice of visiting one another, whether as guests or hosts. **Everyone must truly**

understand each and observe the recommended adab. In the hadeeth of Abu Hurayrah radiyAllaahu *'anh*, Rasulullah **ﷺ said**:

"He who believes in Allah and the Last Day, let him be hospitable to his guest."

(al-Bukhaari and Muslim)

To end the sermon this time, I would like to remind respected congregation to take following the guidelines:

1. The Muslim ummah must comprehend that visitations and strengthening the silaaturrahm are sunnah that are highly recommended in Islam.

2. The Muslim ummah must strive to preserve adab and the rights of the guests, so as to preserve mutual harmony.

Muslim **3.** The ummah must not have bad akhlaaq when visiting others.

"And if you do not find anyone therein, do not enter them until permission has been given to you.

And if it is said to you, "Go back," then go back; it is purer for you. And Allah is Knowing of what you do. "

(Soorah an-Noor 24:28)
